-  Type: Deciduous Shrub
-  Height: 6 - 14'
-  Spread: 12 - 15'
-  Form: Rounded
-  Growth Rate: Slow - Medium
-  Life Expectancy: Medium
-  USDA Zone: 2 - 6
-  Sun: Full
-  Blooms: White
-  Soil Texture: Sand to Sandy Loam, Very Drought Resistant
-  Topography: Upland, well adapted to dry & poor soils
-  Plant Community: Savannah, Old Field, Grassland
-  Origin: MSA Zone 1, 5, 6, MN, N. America
-  Harvest: Become ripe & sweet by the 1st frost in late autumn or early winter
-  Fruit Size: $\frac{1}{4}$ ", ovoid
-  Fruit Color: Bright yellow or scarlet, red harvest
-  Edible: Yes
-  Flavor: Tart / Bitter
-  Use: Jellies & jams
-  Shelf Life: Short
-  Thorny / Spiny branches
-  Use for wildlife plantings and color contrast in borders
-  Also called 'Bullberries'
